Call to Order

Wynne Shaw Committee Vice Chair called the meeting to order at 11:02 a.m.

Public Comment Period (Non-ACA Members)

There was no public comment.

Report of the Chair

Ther was no report from the Chair.

Report of the AAA Director - Jayla Sanchez-Warren

Jayla participated in multiple meetings regarding the updated Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). This comprehensive rewrite by the federal government, the first since 1988, is now complete. The next phase involves the state integrating these federal regulations into their own policies and procedures. Both state and federal authorities have been conducting training sessions to facilitate this transition.

The state has been holding numerous meetings to address waitlist prioritization, aiming to standardize procedures and alleviate the administrative burden on Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) and contractors. Contractors share common concerns about the extensive waitlists, driven by high demand, a shortage of volunteers, and funding deficits. Due to reduced funding, many have had to downsize their staff. Despite applying for grants, contractors have struggled to secure funding, as many grants prioritize new technology or innovative evidence-based applications, while contractors urgently need support for basic services. There is growing concern about the sustainability of these contractors' operations.

The AAA is taking steps, with managers and program managers reviewing workloads and workflows to enhance efficiency despite having fewer staff and higher demand. They aim to reduce staff burnout by working smarter. Managers are also emphasizing the importance of quality documentation and cross-training in other programs. With numerous changes due to new regulations, programs, and compliance responsibilities, Jayla praised the staff for their continued excellent performance.

Move to approve consent agenda.

Items on the consent agenda included: August 23, 2024, meeting summary.

Phil Cernanec motioned for approval. Paul Haseman seconded the motion; the consent agenda was unanimously approved.

Informational Briefings Discussions of Legislative Issues – Rich Mauro

Rich Mauro provided the following updates:

House Bill 1211 was initiated in early February. Rachel Zenzinger carried the bill and was able to get approval by the Joint Budget Committee (JBC). This bill created a \$2 million emergency fund for the AAA's and their contractors to use for financial or operational emergencies caused by a disruption in the delivery of eligible services due to an unexpected change in provider availability or operational capacity; an unintended delay or interruption of state or federal allocations; or an emergency disaster declaration. The state is in the process of implementing guidelines to accept requests for the funding.

Senate Bill 40 was introduced with Senator Jesse Danielson and Representative Mary Young. Part of the motivation for this bill was the JBC's non-committal stance. They were somewhat encouraging, indicating they might take action if funds were available.

The initial draft of the bill included two main provisions. First, it required the state to evaluate the adequacy of state funding for senior services starting in 2024, with updates every three years. Second, it mandated that the budget for that line item be adjusted for inflation annually. However, this provision was removed during the legislative process.

DRCOG amended the bill as it progressed, with significant help from many across the state. They successfully added a \$6 million amendment in the House, it went on to the Senate, when the bill returned to the JBC, it was one of the few amendments passed in both chambers. Traditionally, this is accepted, however, they reduced the funding to \$2 million for the entire state.

DRCOG will continue with the Senate Bill 40 process. The state has taken some time getting started holding a few meetings. They are working on a draft evaluation and plan to engage stakeholders, including the AAAs and other interested parties in the coming months. The bill requires the state to submit a report to the JBC by November. Rich will keep the committee updated on the.

House Bill 1322 builds on a previous bill that authorizes Health Care Policy and Finance (HCPF) to submit a waiver to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). This waiver allows the state to study the feasibility of covering specified housing and nutrition services and report to the General Assembly by November 10, 2024. They have submitted a 1115 waiver request, which waives certain Medicaid provisions for experimental, pilot, or demonstration projects, and are currently awaiting a response from CMS. Once approved, there will be a process to implement the program.

Federal Older Americans Act Reauthorization:

DRCOG is currently developing a federal advocacy plan, which includes updating materials and gathering stories. There was an extensive discussion about ACA members advocating with legislators, either by joining an existing group or forming a subcommittee within the ACA. It was decided to schedule a meeting with Doug Rex, Jayla Sanchez-Warren, Rich Mauro, Bob Brocker, and Wynne Shaw for further discussion.

Rich concluded his update by informing the members that a Continuing Resolution, which will maintain current funding levels as the Federal budget year ends on September 30, is under consideration. He also noted that the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act is expected to be delayed until after the election and the new administration takes office.

Update on DRCOG-Community Care Hub and Payor Contracting – AJ Diamontopoulos

AJ Diamontopoulos updated the members on the recent funding received for the Community Care Hub (Hub). The Hub serves as a single point of contact between healthcare entities and a network of community-based organizations. DRCOG has been working on creating a Hub since 2021. The Hub will be responsible for contracting and payment operations, client referral management, and organizing health-related social needs service delivery in partnership with network providers. It will also handle

technology systems such as data transfer, collection, reporting, governance, and compliance.

DRCOG pursued this endeavor to develop new partnerships and provide additional funds to the AAA. This model works well because it partners with healthcare providers, benefits older adults in the region, and complements the services already provided by the AAA and its partners.

To date, DRCOG has:

- Received a grant to continue the Health Navigation program.
- Received funding to build and deploy a closed-loop referral system to share client information with AAA contractors.
- Hired Torrie Fields Analytics, Inc. to assist with healthcare partnership development.
- Has been accepted into the Health Equity Learning Collaborative to design a new program with Denver Health
- Is one of 20 organizations in the nation to receive funding from the Center of Excellence to develop the Community Care Hub.

The Administration for Community Living (ACL) intends to assist with establishing hubs to complement the AAAs and capitalize on future opportunities being pushed by Medicare. The ACL funded the Center of Excellence to help community-based organizations and states across the country develop the ability to work with healthcare. In August, DRCOG was awarded funding to support these efforts.

In the coming months, the AAA will review the existing technology of the Hub, the AAA, and their contracted partners to establish a baseline of current capabilities. They will evaluate whether to build or buy technology to ensure efficient communication of client information among all partners. Additionally, they will assess delivery costs, the current capacity of each provider, and develop a forward-looking plan. DRCOG will continue collaborating with Torrie Fields to educate network partners on new billing requirements.

In a few months, the AAA anticipates concluding negotiations with Denver Health to implement the program. Through Torrie Fields, they will also begin discussions with Medicare Advantage plans. Additionally, there is potential to seek reimbursement from a new Medicaid community health worker benefit.

In October, Jayla, AJ, and the team from Torrie Fields Analytics will meet with physicians and clinic managers to explore business development opportunities. This is an excellent chance to start small and gradually expand. Multiple clinics are associated with this accountable care organization, making them ideal partners for receiving referrals and providing navigation services.

DRCOG Board Report - DRCOG Board Immediate Past Chair Steve Conklin

Immediate Past Chair Conklin informed the committee that the board is in the process of conducting the Executive Director Review.

DRCOG has received nearly \$200 million in grant funding to support decarbonization efforts. During the last board meeting, they discussed program oversight.

A special meeting will be held to consider the board's position on the RTD Revenue Retention Initiative. Additionally, there was a report on the Federal Boulevard Bus Rapid Transit Project and an update on the Front Range Passenger Rail.

Immediate Past Chair Conklin expressed gratitude to Steve Erickson and the Communications and Marketing team for their efforts on the Awards event.

County Reports

Adams County – Greg Kahler

Adams County hosted a Political Forum where county representatives provided updates on their election activities. Around 60 members and older adults attended, engaging in a Q&A session.

On October 30th, they will have their senior resource fair at the Bison Ridge Recreation Center in Commerce City.

Douglas County – Gretchen Lopez

The Seniors Council, in collaboration with the Douglas County Government, hosted an interactive workshop called "Aging Well, Finishing Strong." The workshop aimed to engage older adults based on their age and medical status, discussing how they can be the best version of themselves.

After a break, participants received legacy binders and discussed the importance of collecting essential information for assistance in case of long-term disability or passing. The goal was to have 50 attendees, and the event featured two panelists, including an attorney who addressed legal issues.

Jefferson County - Name

The Jefferson County Council on Aging will host a candidate forum on October 10th at the Apex Community Recreation Center, located at 6842 Wadsworth Boulevard. The forum will feature candidates serving all of Jefferson County and will cover senior issues such as affordable and accessible housing, independence, health care, safety, food availability, transportation, and property tax.

The former website was last updated nine years ago and could not keep pace with technological advancements in website functionality and design.






Why a web refresh?



Accessibility changes (2 of 2)

Manual check: is the linked document accessible?

This automated checker helps ensure **websites** contain the features needed for accessible content, things like heading structure and text alternatives for images and audio. **It is not able to help you check the documents you link.**

Most mobile and assistive device users prefer to read text on Web pages, where content reflows to fit the screen. If the document linked here cannot be converted to a Web page, make sure the document is well structured (headings, lists, table headers) and provides alt text for its images.
