NANCY LEAVITT, AN ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNER WITH DENVER WATER, COINED THE TERM *XERISCAPE* IN 1981 BY COMBINING *LANDSCAPE* WITH THE GREEK PREFIX *XERO-*, MEANING 'DRY'.







THE TERM ZEROSCAPING IS SOMETIMES
SUBSTITUTED FOR XERISCAPING. ZEROSCAPING
USUALLY REFERS TO A DIFFERENT TYPE OF LOWWATER LANDSCAPING THAT USES VERY FEW
PLANTS OR NONE AT ALL.

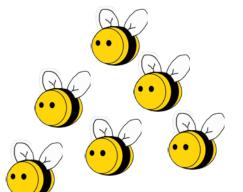

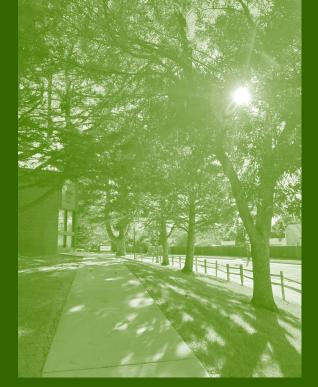
- Jeffco Board of Education sold the property to a developer seeking to build single-family homes.

Action Plan

- Engage with the City of Westminster City Council and the Planning Commission
 - Petition against rezoning the parcel to accommodate low-density housing.
 - Provide a summary of neighborhood sentiment.
 - Present community desires for the space.
- Connect with Neighborhood Lead: offer time and skills to gain neighborhood support and time to discuss proposed plans.
- Raise awareness of the proposed plan: create a platform for neighbors to share their sentiments and receive updates.

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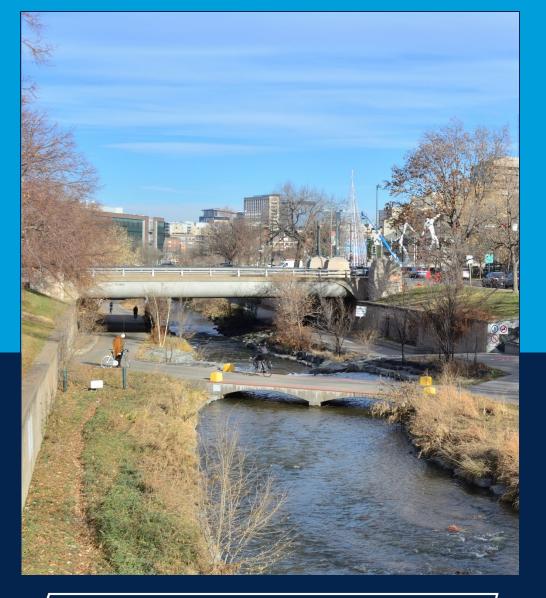

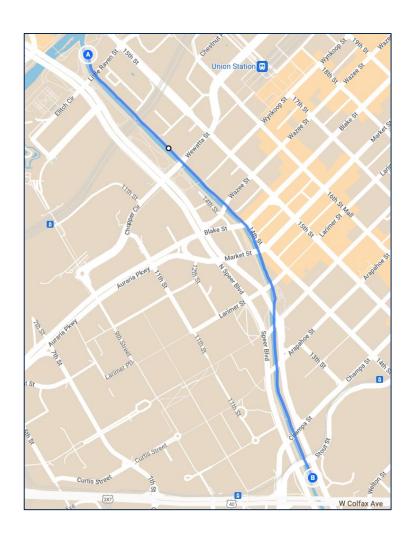


Traditional Adopt-A-Trail programs rely on volunteers for regular clean-up and/or maintenance.

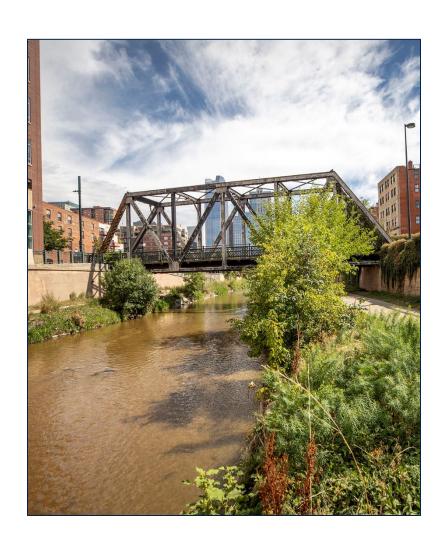
This program would initially prioritize the pedestrian-specific stretch from Confluence Park to Colfax Avenue (roughly 1 mile in length).

Englewood has extremely wide residential streets



South Huron Street

- Englewood residential streets are very wide
- Streets like South Huron, South Acoma and Kenyon have cars going speeds of 35 mph and higher
- Dangerous for pedestrians
- Many children cross these streets
- Lack of any traffic calming measures on these streets

Solutions



Curb extension crosswalk in Littleton

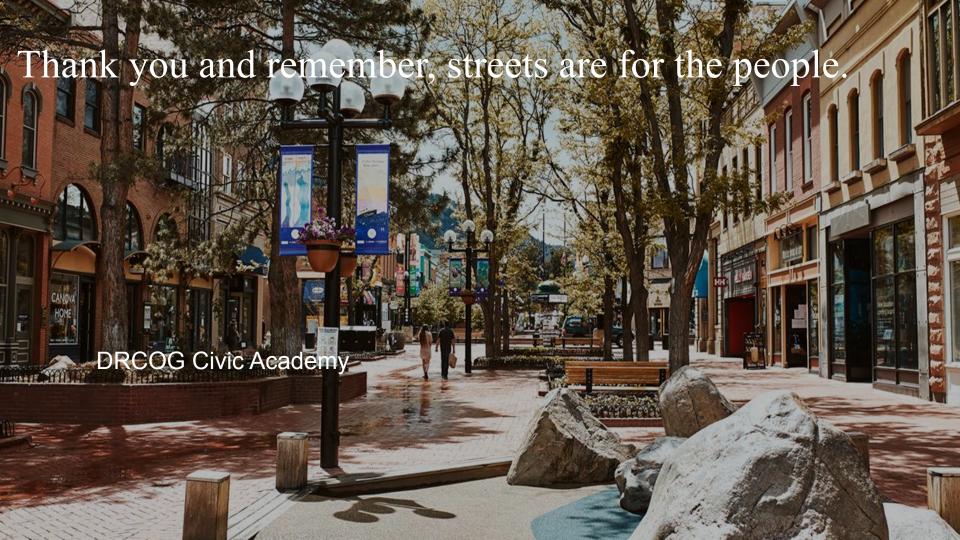


- Adding curb extensions to intersections(bulbed out)
- More 4-way stops added
- Mini roundabouts
- Crosswalks with crossing signs within the street
- Street narrowing with paint or poles
- Curb extension crosswalks
- Raised crosswalks or speed bumps

What I will do to change Englewood's residential streets



- I will go to city council meetings to explain this issue
- I will contact the Englewood city manager Shawn Lewis to stress the issue
- Campaign to make Englewood residential streets safer

RTD's Public Drug Use Problem

A Place-Based, Services Oriented Solution

RTD RIDERSHIP DOWN BY 40%

- RTD exists to provide a viable alternative to single occupancy vehicles.
- RTD has a public drug use problem which negatively impacts the experience of using its services.
- The perception of an unsafe transit environment is a major reason ridership remains low.

FROM "HELLHOLE" TO DIASPORA OF THE VULNERABLE



- In 2021 RTD's GM/CEO and Board, reacting to a public declaration by the head of RTD's Union Local that Union Station had become a "hellhole" instituted policies to "discourage loitering of 'non-destination' individuals".
- The forced exodus of these vulnerable folks from "Denver's Living Room" resulted in a diaspora that spread across RTD's system and remains a problem to this day.

IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE LIKE THIS

- Last year, just in Denver, 575 folks died of a drug related death, our most ever.
- Every overdose death is preventable.
- Denver lacks public health interventions to reduce rates of public drug use.
- A transit adjacent harm reduction facility would significantly impact rates of public drug use.
- Numerous peer-reviewed scientific studies have proven the positive impacts of harm reduction facilities.
- No one's son or daughter has ever died at an HRF.

WHAT IS HARM REDUCTION?

- Harm reduction is a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing the public health risks associated with drug use.
- Harm Reduction calls for the non-judgmental, non-coercive provision of services and resources to people who use drugs, and the communities in which they live, in order to assist them in reducing harm.
- Harm Reduction is not the opposite of Recovery, it is just the more patient and sustainable route.

A HUB OF HOPE



- The University of Denver Station has 40,000 sf of retail space.
- It's been vacant for 18 years, since the station opened in 2006.
- Denver's Harm Reduction
 Action Center would LOVE
 to set up shop there.

S CONNECT THE DOTS

- This is one of four 10,000 SF retail spaces currently used for storage at the DU Station.
- RTD is considering putting its Transit Police HQ onsite.
- A Harm Reduction Facility co-located with them would make for great synergies.
- Just a place to be, with care providers, clean syringes and support referrals will keep folks alive and make RTD's "Welcoming Transit Environment" a reality for all.

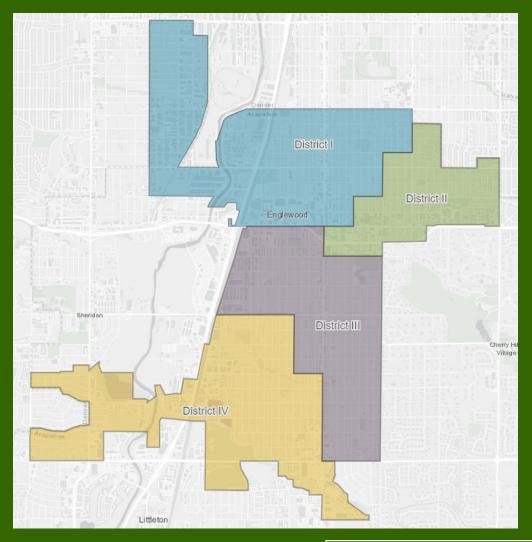

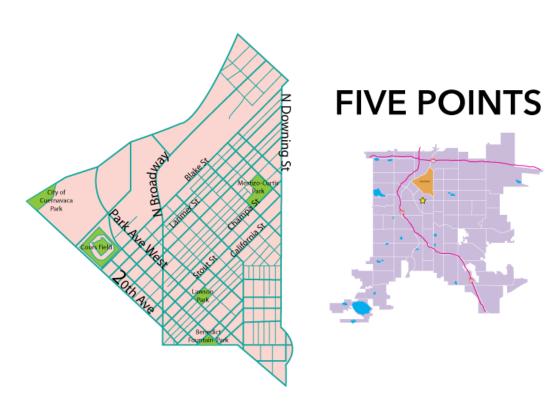

Understanding the problem: why are there so few grocery stores in the RiNo and Five Points neighborhoods?

- Five Points: historically Black neighborhood, historic food desert
 - USDA definition: an area where at least 500 people, or 33% of the population, live over a mile from a grocery store or large supermarket
- RiNo: historically industrial area with growing residential and commercial uses... and one specialty grocery store
- Increasing population growth and density, gentrification → grocery stores?





Identifying solutions: grocery stores, food co-ops, farmer's markets



- Ideal: multiple new affordable grocery stores
- Could help: food co-op
- Within reach: a RiNo-Five Points farmer's market
 - Must-haves:
 - Produce and other standard, non-specialty grocery vendors
 - Affordability (reasonable prices, accepting SNAP, EBT, and other forms of food assistance)
 - Nice-to-haves:
 - Centrally located (Larimer?)
 - In an empty lot or 2900 Larimer pedestrian block
 - Open year-round



Action plan: steps toward creating the RiNo/Five Points Farmer's Market

- Immediate outreach:
 - Operators of former RiNo farmer's market (ended in 2020)
 - Operators of other Denver farmer's markets
 - Nearby businesses and property owners (e.g., Denver Central Market, Graffiti Gardens, Farm + Market)
 - Vendors at other Denver farmer's markets
 - RiNo Business Improvement District and General Improvement District
 - Neighbors, residents
- Future steps:
 - Working with operating company/organization to plan and obtain permits and approvals (property use, city permits, outreach to potential vendors, etc.)
 - Surveying residents about details (location, timing, types of vendors)

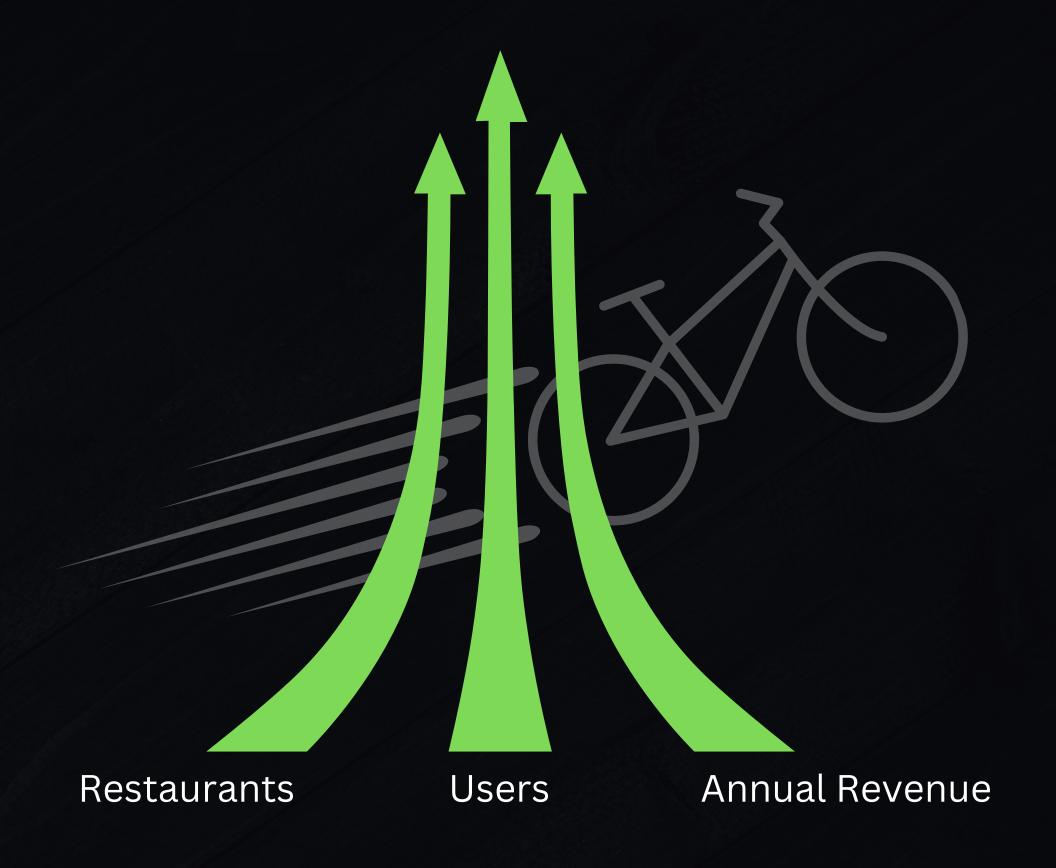

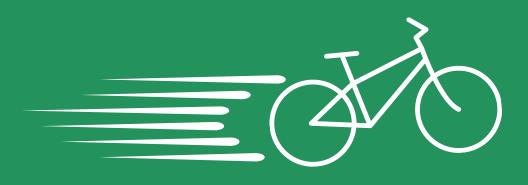

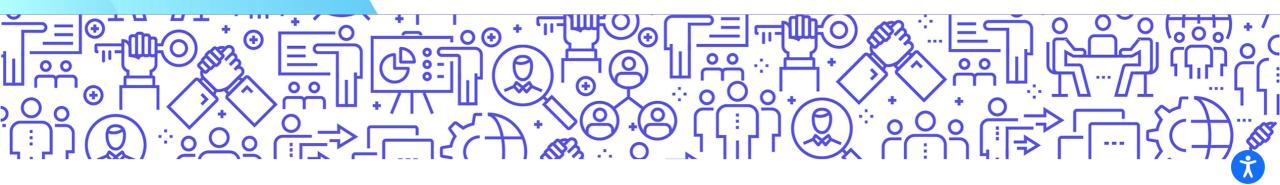

Revising Lakewood's Land Dedication Ordinance

Presented by Marianne Nagel DrCog Civic Academy October 21,2024 **The Problem**: Green Space has not been added as multifamily development has replaced former retail ares.







Things to know about this issue:

Land dedication is not the same a open space zoning requirements.

Current Ordinance requires land dedication or fee-in-lieu on all residential development at a rate of 5.5 acres per 1000 population added.

In the current Ordinance, if the parcel under development is less than 15 acres in size, land dedication or fee-in-lieu is at the discretion of the Community Resources Director. Fees have been accepted on all projects for the last six years.

All projects in Lakewood are approved administratively.

Fees were recently increased from 246K/acre to 433K/acre. Actual land cost is about 830K/acre.

Timeline

October 2021 Letter to Council Candidates

CONNECTING THROUGH CLUBS: BUILDING BRIDGING CAPITAL THROUGH MEMBERSHIP

The Challenge: "Bowling Alone" Phenomenon

- Beyond a decline in membership, seeing a decline in feeling like we're connected with each other, and that we trust each other
 - Partisanship
 - Mental Health strain
 - Loneliness
 - Good news: Coloradans are less lonely than average Americans (38% compared to 40.3%) – perhaps indicates more of a willingness to join/participate in communal activities? Or perhaps a reflection of our population & age



A Solution: Building Bridging Social Capital

- Bridging & Bonding
 - Bonding social capital
 - Refers to close-knit, strong ties between people who are similar and share a background.
 Bonding social capital is often exclusive and can seem inward looking.
 - Bridging social capital
 - Refers to weaker ties that connect people who are different, have different backgrounds, and belong to different networks. Bridging social capital is often more inclusive and can help create new forms of community.
- So, how do we build it??



The Opportunity: A Tabling Event for Clubs & Membership Organizations

- During Denver Days?
- Survey community to know what kinds of groups they'd like to join
- Bring organizations together to showcase themselves to a community hungry for connection
- Share database of clubs, organizations to be a lasting resource

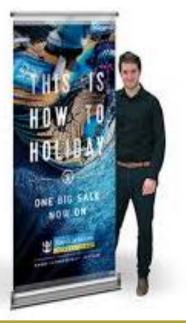

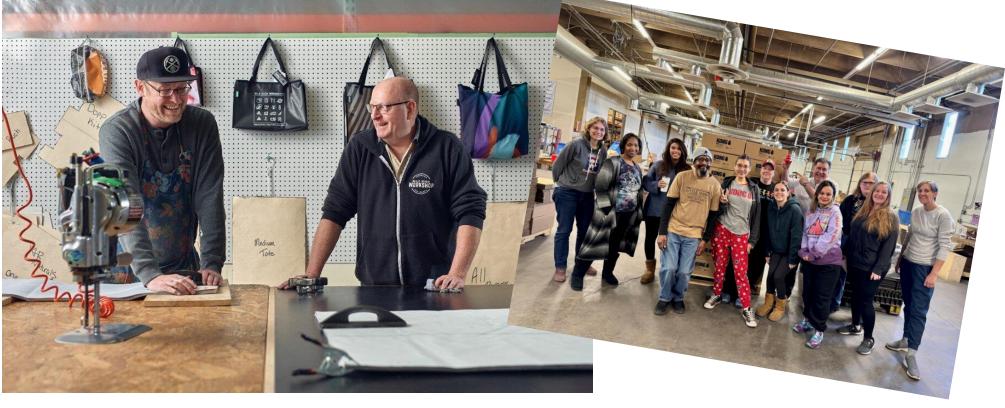

- Sustainability, Collaboration and Impact: In 2023, they saved 3 tons of banner material from going to the landfill!!

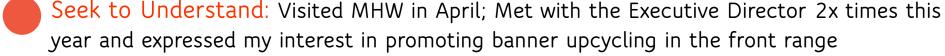

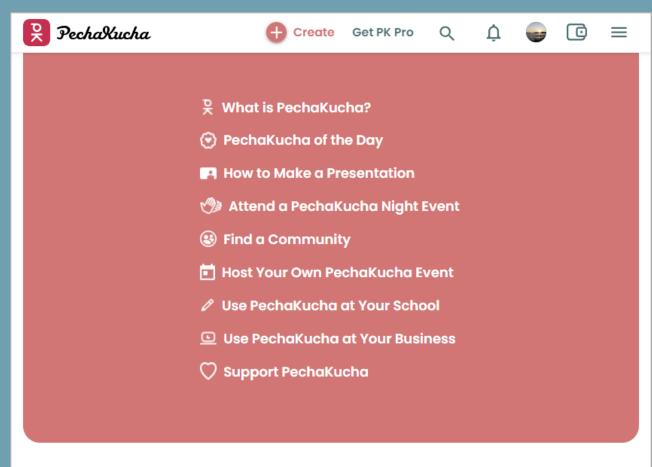

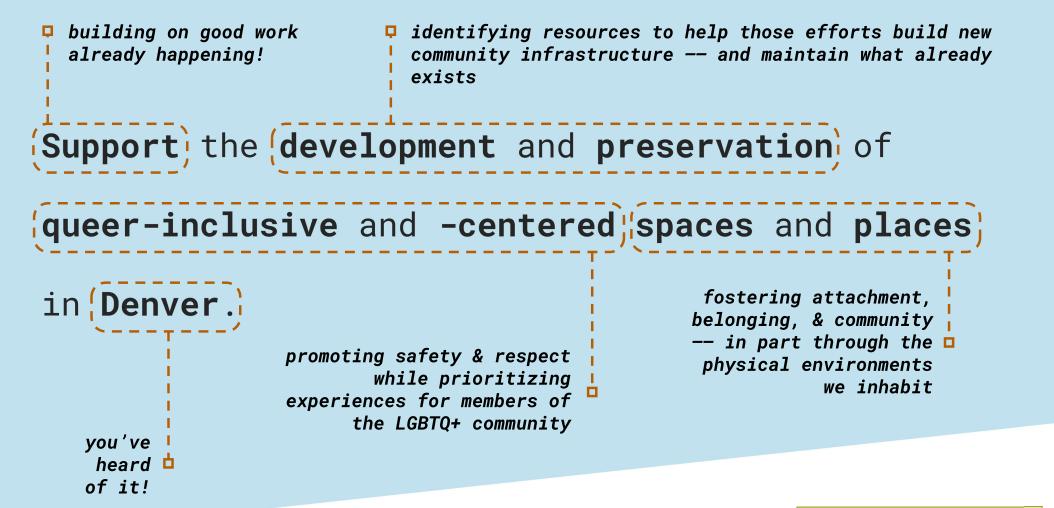
