Community Clean Transportation Assistance Program

Agenda item type: Discussion

Summary

Colorado Department of Transportation staff will provide an overview of the Notice of Funding Opportunity for the Community Clean Transportation Assistance Program (CCTAP).

Background

The Nonattainment Area Air Pollution Mitigation Enterprise (NAAPME) was created by Senate Bill 21-260 to mitigate the environmental and health impacts of increased air pollution from motor vehicle emissions in Colorado's air quality nonattainment areas. The Community Clean Transportation Assistance Program (CCTAP) is the enterprise's first grant funding opportunity. It will make awards in amounts between \$500,000 to \$17 million by the end of July 2025. A 20% local match is required, though hardship waivers are possible.

The NAAPME 10-Year Plan identifies the following funding focus areas:

- Projects that sustainably reduce traffic congestion (transit services, mobility hubs, sidewalks & bike paths, car-/vanpools, etc.).
- Projects that reduce the environmental and health impacts of transportation (lowering construction impacts, roadside vegetation, etc.).
- Projects that improve neighborhood connectivity for communities adjacent to highways (sidewalks, bike/ped connectivity, reduce urban traffic speeds, etc.).

Projects eligible under the federal <u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ)</u> program are also eligible for this funding.

Eligible project sponsors are a metropolitan planning organization or any other public entity that is eligible to receive CMAQ funding that is in <u>good standing with the Colorado Secretary of State</u>, have no projects on the federal inactive list, and have not had a non-compliance determination on a sub-allocated recipient audit/visit.

Applications will be evaluated on the following criteria:

- Emissions reduction benefits in ozone precursors (25 percent).
- Project is located within or supports a disproportionately impacted community, demonstrated outreach to engage with those communities, and how the project would help address community needs and/or issues (25 percent).
- Project meets NAAPME business purpose and funding focus areas (15 percent).
- Project is prioritized in an approved transportation plan (15 percent).
- Demonstrates likelihood of successful project delivery, including commitment for longterm maintenance of infrastructure projects (5 percent).



- Demonstrates that the project improves traveling safety, especially for vulnerable road users (5 percent).
- Demonstrates improvement/expansion of transportation choice or neighborhood connectivity (5 percent).
- Quality of the application (5 percent).

Complete eligibility and evaluation criteria are available in the <u>CCTAP Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> (which is also available in <u>Spanish</u>).
