Budget and Timeline


We have expended less than 1% of the budget (about \$2 million).



Overview of incentives, advising and low-income communities programs

Strategic Goals

- Highly efficient, all-electric buildings are status quo.
- Building upgrades are easily navigable by all.
- Incentives and programs support contractor's businesses.

Objectives

- 1,600 low-income households retrofit by 2029.
- 39,800 housing units and businesses advised by 2029
- Incentives for 26,000 single- and multi-family units and 4.15M sq. ft. commercial space by 2029
- All in pursuit of pollution reduction objectives

Full-service low-income program (\$48 Million)

Program Vision

- A comprehensive initiative designed to accelerate the adoption of clean space and water heating technologies across homes in the Denver metropolitan area.
- The program aims to enhance the well-being of lowincome households while advancing regional decarbonization goals.
- By addressing barriers to building efficiency and electrification holistically, the program seeks to transform the market and create lasting, equitable change.
- Serve more than 1,600 low-income households by 2030
- From community feedback: Access to cooling, health and indoor air quality, utility bills, safe and secure housing are timely and critical needs.




Innovation pilot program (\$6 Million)

- Award an average of \$200,000 per subaward to entrepreneurial businesses, technologies, CBO's with high potential to accelerate electrification and energy efficiency adoption and bust barriers to service delivery.
 - Demonstrate scalable solutions to key market barriers via regional pilot projects.
 - Inform decarbonization decision-making with public data, analyses, and case studies.
- Target small businesses, novel approaches and community-driven innovations
- Oversight Committee will evaluate grant criteria and selections.

BPC Structure

Steering Committee

Full BPC – all participating communities.

BPC Updates & Next Steps

- First full BPC meeting held August 7.
 - ~ 60 attendees including staff and contractors representing 29 jurisdictions.
- First round of cohort meetings complete.
- Building Decarbonization Roadmap to be developed by cohorts through December 2025 and finalized by January / February of 2026.
- **2026** divide into policy working groups to develop model policies and work on policy implementation.







Subaward Goals

- Reduce building-related climate pollution emissions through local policy change and support community-wide efforts.
- Support jurisdictions' capacity to adopt and implement local building policies, maximizing regional consistency.
- Support jurisdictions in BPC participation.

Jurisdictional Support Program

\$34.8 million in subawards to DRCOG's member governments.

- 4 applications received so far totaling \$5.9 million (Denver, Lakewood, Westminster, Longmont).
- Anticipate numerous additional applications to be submitted by jurisdictions in September and October with contracting to take place October through December.

Application focus areas:

- Staffing to support policy adoption and implementation (energy analysts, plan reviewers, codes officials, inspectors).
- Streamlining heat pump permitting.
- Adopting advanced energy codes and benchmarking programs.



Jurisdictional Support Program next steps

Now through October 30, 2025

continued outreach and support to jurisdictions to encourage applications.



February, 2026 – design of round 2 subaward policy.

continued application review and contracting.

Now through December 2025

Research

- \$1 million budget for localized research.
 - Solicited RFP feedback from key partners
 - Anticipate issuing RFP in September
 - Key Research areas:
 - Policy modeling costs, benefits, and equity impacts of strengthening local energy/emissions policies identified in the roadmap.
 - Building stock analysis and retrofit strategies.
 - Electrification baseline & grid readiness.
 - Electric-preferred policy effectiveness & unintended consequences.
