Public Comment Period (Non-ACA Members)

There was no Public Comment.

Report of the Chair

Cathy sat in on the Funding Subcommittee RFP review.

Report of the AAA Director

Jayla did several media interviews and presentations

- Colorado Public Radio, Colorado Matters, PBS, and channel 8 show with Mayor Hancock, Channel 9, and Channel 4.
- Presentation to Colorado Healthcare Strategy and Management group, Audio Information Network annual meeting.
- Governor's Lifelong Initiative has laid low for a while but with Jarrett Hughes now working at the Governor's office it has been reborn. This brings attention to the aging population, makes people more aware at the state and local level which helps with funding.

Vaccines

- More vaccines getting out to the public, now able to vaccinate the 65+ population.
- Participated in the SCL event on February 6th, provided transportation to participants through Hop Skip Drive and Via.
- There are many more hospitals, and other companies that would like to have DRCOG provide transportation.
 - Jayla explained to these organizations that this was a finite resource and is limited.
 - The healthcare organizations are having events at the same times and dates complicating the issue.
 - Additionally, for every vaccine given they receive more vaccine and are receiving money from both the federal government and insurance companies.
- Jayla, AJ, and Travis met with the DRCOG transportation providers to see how these events could be handled. These rides would be in addition to the normal services they provide.
 They worked out a different rate for the providers since they need to stay with the client rather than just dropping them off.
- There will be another large SCL event on March 6th.

Phil Cernanec mentioned that the rotary volunteers are helping with transportation to vaccinations, he will send Jayla the information.

Move to approve consent agenda

Items on the consent agenda included: Summary of the January 15, 2021 meeting.

Cathy asked for a motion to approve the consent agenda, Bob Davis made the motion, Dawn Perez seconded the motion. There was unanimous approval of the consent agenda with one change on page 3, the number of seniors should be 300,000.

ACA formed a Transportation Subcommittee to look at long term sustainability of transportation services as it considers preparing for a growing population, funding sources, and partnering with others

 The subcommittee will decide the makeup of the committee members looking for diverse contributors

Discussion

Doug responded that he would like to have the subcommittee provide innovative solutions, lower the cost per ride,

Sean Wood asked about autonomous vehicles in DRCOG future. Doug said it was on the front burner for DRCOG. Cathy stated that we will still need to address the most vulnerable population who need help getting in and out of a vehicle and may not be for this new technology.

Tex suggested that there be a core committee that would address some of the things that need to be accomplished.

Lisa Houde and Jacob Rigor from the DRCOG Transportation Division presented the 2050 DRCOG Metro Vision Regional Transportation Plan

- The Plan is through 2050, DRCOG updates the plan every 4 years.

- There are 6 project and program investment priorities
 - Multimodal mobility which will provide more ways to travel by car, bus, bicycle, and foot.
 - Freight maintains efficient movement of goods within & beyond the region.
 - Active transportation expands travel options for vulnerable and underserved transportation users.
 - Safety will increase the safety for all users of the transportation system.
 - Air quality improve air quality and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
 - Regional transit expands the region's rapid transit network.

• The Plan will be out for a 30-day comment period and a public hearing will be held at the DRCOG Board meetings on March 17th.

Nymbl Science Update and Demonstration

Nathan Estrada from Nymbl Sciences told the group that they have partnered with DRCOG in offering a free at-home balance program.

- The program offers:
 - A smartphone app to accommodate an individual's unique balance needs that will improve balance and provide the freedom to maintain their lifestyle and balance.
 - Users of the app are less worried about falling because they are more confident while walking and have better balance.
 - Can be done at home without having to attend an in-person balance class and engages those who are unwilling or unable to attend traditional balance classes
- People can enroll in the pilot which will end in June.
- Nymbl would like to get 5,000 participants registered by the end of pilot and hope to become a partner with DRCOG beginning July 1st.
- A toolkit has been designed and is available to promote the program.











SUBJECT

This item is regarding funding allocations for new and existing AAA contractors for the 2022 state fiscal year.

PROPOSED ACTION/RECOMMENDATIONS

DRCOG staff recommends approval of funding allocations to new and existing contractors for the 2022 state fiscal year, as reviewed and recommended by the ACA funding subcommittee.

ACTION BY OTHERS

ACA Funding Subcommittee met in February and March to review proposals from the SFY2022 Request for Proposals and have made funding recommendations

SUMMARY

A Request for Proposals (RFP) was issued by the AAA in November 2021 to solicit service proposals from local community service providers for the next contract cycle commencing July 1, 2021. A total of 33 providers submitted 87 service proposals.

The ACA funding subcommittee spent significant time reviewing and discussing proposals. Proposals were scored on various criteria including: 1) need for the service in the region, 2) demonstrated experience and performance, 3) cost information, and 4) other factors such as service coverage, coordination with other providers, and targeted populations. Following an extensive review, the ACA funding subcommittee recommends contracting with 32 providers with 76 service proposals amongst them. Their recommended funding allocations are attached.

The total recommended allocations of approximately \$16.2 million will be funded from state (SFSS) and federal Title III Older Americans Act (OAA) dollars, as well as from an anticipated second round of CARES Act stimulus funding. DRCOG expects to receive an option letter from Colorado Department of Human Services to receive OAA/SFSS/CARES funding for SFY2021-2022. Though funding for the 2021-2022 state fiscal year has not been finalized, fiscal year contractor pass-through funds are initially estimated at approximately \$18 million but could reach as high as \$27 million. As such, contract amounts are an estimate and are subject to available funds. The ACA funding subcommittee will continue to evaluate funding levels and will make recommendations for sub-recipient awards accordingly.

SUMMARY

Several new health care initiatives that will dramatically increase the number of referrals to community-based organizations in the coming months and years. Those initiatives are:

- the Social Health Information Exchange that is currently being designed by the State of Colorado to send referrals from clinical providers to community-based providers
- the Hospital Transformation that will incentivize hospitals to screen Medicaid patients for health-related social needs and then send referrals to communitybased providers to address those needs

Despite these efforts to send massive numbers of referrals, no funding is currently being proposed or provided to pay for the added referrals or services.

The briefing will update the committee on DRCOG's effort to create a Wellness Fund, an initiative designed to increase the service capacity of community-based organizations to serve people of all ages with the services they require.
