US 36 Bus Rapid Transit Station Area and Connectivity Open House

How can I get to Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) stations on US 36 by walking or biking? How can I store my bike at the stations? What can I expect from the BRT experience?

The US 36 corridor currently is undergoing a major transformation into a multi-modal corridor that will dramatically improve travel options and implement the RTD FasTracks voter-approved US 36 BRT. Several organizations are working to improve connections to BRT and the overall experience of riders. With opening anticipated in 2016, planning and construction are already in full swing!

Local-level plans have been developed for individual stops along the line. The Sustainable Communities Initiative (SCI) looks at the entire corridor to create a unifying vision and goals, identify challenges and opportunities, and develop transit-oriented development (TOD) implementation strategies. That's where you come in--**we want your feedback on how to make the US 36 corridor successful!**

Who: Anyone who lives, works, or plays in the US 36 corridor--residents, community and business leaders, and elected officials.

What: The Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) and 36 Commuting Solutions are hosting an informative, fun and family-friendly open house about connectivity to BRT stations along the US 36 corridor. Interactive exhibits will provide information and allow participants to give feedback on several topics including: first- and final-mile connections to stations and bicycle/pedestrian access. See the design of new BRT vehicles and station canopies. **Light refreshments will be served and Spanish interpretation services will be available.**
