DRCOG TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARING MARCH 18 Draft 2016-2021 Transportation Improvement Program

March 9, 2015 (Denver, Colorado) – The Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) Board of Directors will hold a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 18, 2015, at 1290 Broadway, Denver. The hearing is an opportunity to comment on the draft 2016-2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and associated air quality conformity documents – DRCOG Carbon Monoxide (CO) and Particulate Matter (PM₁₀) Conformity Determination, and the Denver Southern Subarea 8-hour Ozone Conformity Determination.

The TIP, which identifies federally-funded surface transportation projects to be implemented in the Denver region from fiscal years 2016 through 2021, is developed in a cooperative process involving local governments through DRCOG, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and the Regional Transportation District (RTD). The TIP reflects nearly \$3.72 billion programmed over six years by DRCOG, CDOT and RTD.
