Communities throughout the Denver region are placing an increased emphasis on enhancing personal mobility, reducing motor vehicle travel, improving air quality and supporting healthy lifestyles. Residents expect transportation networks to be multimodal, well-connected and accessible for users of various abilities. Communities across the region are introducing new bike-share systems and technologies. Presenters and participants will discuss stakeholder engagement and outreach strategies, regulatory options for permitting bike-share systems, and current and future options for bike sharing.

Speakers will include Hans Reichgelt, trails specialist, City of Westminster; Brenden Paradies, planner, City of Aurora; Cindy Patton, acting manager of parking and mobility services, Denver Public Works; and Austin Good, management analyst, City of Lone Tree.

TIP spotlight: Bicycle and pedestrian bridge on CU Boulder campus

On the University of Colorado Boulder campus, work has begun on a \$6 million bicycle and pedestrian bridge to replace the 19th Street Bridge which was destroyed during floods in 2013. The 10-foot, Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant bridge will connect Boulder Creek Trail to the campus. Funding sources include \$4.8 million from DRCOG-administered federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality dollars, with the remaining \$1.2 million provided by CU Boulder.

There's a new-and-improved resource at DRCOG: the Regional Data Catalog. As part of DRCOG's website, the catalog provides open data for GIS professionals and planners within local governments, at partner agencies, at academic institutions and in the private sector. The redeveloped catalog recategorizes information in a more intuitive way; standardizes naming conventions and keywords; employs more flexible search methods; allows users to sort and filter results by topic, date and format; and provides data in more formats and includes a web map gallery.

Bike to Work Day registration is open!

Registration opened earlier this week for <u>Bike to Work Day</u>, which takes place June 27 this year. Celebrated the fourth Wednesday of every June, the event caps off Colorado Bike Month. (Due to the state's unpredictable spring weather, Colorado commemorates biking to work about a month later than most other states.)

In early April, representatives from more than 100 local businesses and civic organizations dropped by the Bike to Work Day open house to meet with Way to Go staff, pick up signs and posters, map their routes and choose station locations. (Boulder's Bike to Work Day open house takes place at 3 p.m., May 22 at the Boulder Chamber.)
