You helped make Bike to Work Day a success

We did it again! Thanks to the participation of your communities' residents, organizations and businesses, an estimated 35,277 participants traded their regular commutes for bicycles on Bike to Work Day, approximately a thousand more than last year. I love the energy and excitement of Bike to Work Day, and it was encouraging to see how many of our member governments took part, with 20 jurisdictionsponsored stations.

About 300 stations offered breakfast, water and bike-home

parties for participants. Almost 40 percent of riders were first-time participants. Commuters logged an average of 8.8 miles by bicycle, saved 270 tons of carbon dioxide and burned 38.8 million calories.

Nearly 800 companies competed in the Business Challenge, with Google Boulder taking first place; National Center for Atmospheric Research/University Corporation for Atmospheric Research, second place; and Davis Partnership Architects, third place. Google Boulder took first place among large businesses, and VisionLink among small companies.

Thank you to DRCOG's Way to Go team, as well as your communities' residents, organizations and businesses for making bicycle commuting possible on Bike to Work Day — and every day.

Citizens' Academy was formerly a program of Transit Alliance. Before its dissolution earlier this year, Transit Alliance approached DRCOG to take over Citizens' Academy. DRCOG had long supported Transit Alliance and Citizens' Academy through funding and participation, and agreed to renew our commitment to this important forum for citizen engagement, learning and action.

DRCOG staff, under the direction of Brad Calvert, director of Regional Planning and Development, are busily preparing to recruit participants and conduct the first Citizens' Academy under DRCOG's auspices. DRCOG developing a transportation hub for veterans and older adults

Since last September, DRCOG staff has been leveraging a Veterans Transportation and Community Living Initiative grant from the Federal Transit Administration to improve access to transportation by veterans, service members, military families, older adults and people with disabilities. Matthew Helfant, senior transportation planner, has been convening monthly meetings of a stakeholder group to provide insight and advice. Under the grant, DRCOG will develop a trip exchange platform for transportation providers to facilitate sharing trips. DRCOG recently executed a contract with RouteMatch to begin development of the application. The stakeholder group meets the third Thursday of the month. Materials are available on the event calendar at DRCOG's website.



Way to Go campaigns recognized for excellence

Three of Way to Go's 2017 public relations and marketing campaigns, executed by Cohn Marketing, were recently recognized with awards. Way to Go is a regional partnership of DRCOG and seven transportation management associations that helps commuters make commuting choices that reduce traffic congestion and improve air quality.

The Colorado chapter of the Business Marketing Association awarded Way to Go a Gold Key award for its Bike to Work Day public relations efforts. Way to Go received platinum recognition from the international Hermes Creative Awards for its integrated marketing campaign. And the Communicator Awards, also an international competition, honored Way to Go with an award of distinction for its marketing communications plan.



Get the data you need and save money

At the last Board of Directors meeting, Ashley Summers, DRCOG's information systems manager, provided an overview of DRCOG's planimetric data project. As part of her presentation, she highlighted how participation helps local governments obtain the data they need, conserve staff effort and save money.

During her presentation, Ashley provided information about how the following member governments have used DRCOG planimetric data:

- Aurora used building roofprints to build a custom base map for its web maps. Its fire department used the data to create preplan maps for emergency response.
- Arapahoe County increased community safety and decreased insurance costs by using building roofprints to participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Community Rating System for national flood insurance.
- Douglas County inventoried sidewalk ramps, cutting field time in half.
- Jefferson County mapped safe routes to schools using sidewalk data.

These are just a few examples of how cities, towns and counties are benefiting from DRCOG's regional data efforts, and doing so at a fraction of the cost and staff time. Your community's data staff should have already received estimates for participation in the upcoming planimetrics project, let Ashley know if we missed you.
