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
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Introduction

Background

The Denver Regional Council of Governments is a planning organization through which local governments collaborate to establish guidelines, set policy and allocate funding in the areas of transportation and personal mobility, growth and development, and aging and disability resources.

- DRCOG is a council of governments, serving as a planning organization, technical assistance provider and forum for local member governments.
- DRCOG functions as a regional planning commission per Colorado state statute and prepares the plan for the physical development of the region, known as Metro Vision.
- DRCOG is the federally designated Area Agency on Aging, planning and providing comprehensive services to address the needs of the region's population of older adults and people living with disabilities.
- DRCOG serves as the metropolitan planning organization for the region carrying out the metropolitan transportation planning process for four urbanized areas, encompassing slightly more than 3,600 square miles.

DRCOG's planning area covers Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Clear Creek, Douglas, Gilpin and Jefferson counties, the City and County of Broomfield and the City and County of Denver, and southwest Weld County.

Limited English proficiency

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, most people who live in the U.S. read, write, speak and understand English. There are many people, however, for whom English is not their primary language. If those individuals have a limited ability to read, write, speak or understand English, they are considered limited English proficient, or "LEP." Language barriers often inhibit, or prohibit, people with limited English proficiency from accessing benefits and services, from understanding and exercising rights, from fulfilling responsibilities and obligations, and from understanding information provided to them regarding federally funded programs, activities and services.

The Denver Regional Council of Governments receives funding from several federal sources for its activities. For example, in the past funding has come from or through the:

- U.S. Department of Transportation.
- Older Americans Act.
- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- U.S. Department of Energy.

DRCOG is committed to engaging and involving all residents of the Denver region, including those with limited English Proficiency, in its activities. Therefore, in accordance with the best practice standards for public involvement, together with assistance from the Colorado Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration, DRCOG has developed the Limited English Proficiency Plan. The Limited English Proficiency Plan outlines:

- How individuals who may need language assistance are identified.
- The ways in which assistance is provided.
- Staff training required.
- How individuals with limited English proficiency are notified that assistance is available.

The goal of the Limited English Proficiency Plan is to ensure all residents of the DRCOG region can, to the fullest extent practicable, participate in DRCOG activities.

Title VI and Executive Order No. 13166

Section 601 of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, codified as amended (42 U.S.C. §2000d), provides that no person in the United States shall "on the grounds of race, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

Consistent with, and in accordance with, Section 602 of Title VI, (42 U.S.C. § 2000d-1), the Department of Justice promulgated regulations prohibiting recipients of federal funds from "utilizing criteria or methods of administration which have the effect of subjecting

individuals to discrimination because of their race, color, or national origin, or have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishment of the objectives of the program as respects individuals of a particular race, color, or national origin." The Department of Transportation later promulgated nearly identical regulations - See 49 C.F.R. § 21.5(b) (vii) (2).

To further clarify rights protected by Title VI, President William J. Clinton, on Aug. 11, 2000, issued Executive Order No. 13166, Improving Access to Service for Persons with Limited English Proficiency. The order requires each federal agency to examine its programs and activities and to develop and implement plans so individuals with limited English proficiency can meaningfully access those programs and activities. The executive order includes the following statement:

Each Federal Agency shall prepare a plan to improve access to its federally conducted programs and activities by eligible LEP persons. Each plan shall be consistent with the standards set forth in the LEP Guidance, and shall include the steps the agency will take to ensure that eligible LEP persons can meaningfully access the agency's programs and activities.

In conjunction with Executive Order No. 13166, the U.S. Department of Justice issued a general guidance document setting forth various principles for agencies to consider in developing guidance documents for recipients of federal funds. (See Enforcement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 — National Origin Discrimination against Persons with Limited English Proficiency, 65 Fed. Reg. 50123).

Department of Transportation and limited English proficiency policy guidance

In accordance with Executive Order No. 13166, the U.S. Department of Transportation, on Dec. 14, 2005, issued its Policy Guidance Concerning Recipients' Responsibilities to Limited English Proficient Persons. Adopting the framework established by the Department of Justice in its Aug. 11, 2000, guidance, the U.S. Department of Transportation identifies four factors that should be considered by a recipient of federal funds in assessing the needs of individuals with limited English proficiency and implementing a plan to address those needs.

The four factors include:

- 1) The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by the program or grantee.
- 2) The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the program.
- 3) The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the program to people's lives.
- 4) The resources available to the grantee/recipient or agency, and costs.

The greater the number or proportion of eligible individuals with limited English proficiency, the greater the frequency with which they will have contact with a program, activity or service and the more likely enhanced language services will be needed. The intent is to strike a balance ensuring individuals with limited English proficiency have meaningful access to critical services without unduly burdening the local agency.

Older Americans Act guidance on "targeting" services

In accordance with the Older Americans Act and the Colorado Department of Human Services, State Unit on Aging Rule Manual Volume 10, area agencies on aging are required to target older adults who are in some way socially or economically disadvantaged. This includes, but is not limited to, giving "preference and priority in the delivery of services ... to older adults with limited English proficiency." It is expected that each contracted service provider has a policy in place detailing how to do so.



Limited English proficiency assessment of the Denver region

Background

The Denver Regional Council of Governments planning area consists of nine entire counties and county equivalents (Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Broomfield, Clear Creek, Denver, Douglas, Jefferson and Gilpin) as well as southwest Weld County. DRCOG used the most recent census data to understand the profile of individuals that may participate in DRCOG activities.

For the purposes of the Limited English Proficiency Plan, people five years and older who identified themselves as speaking English less than "very well" are considered to be individuals with limited English proficiency. Map 2.1 and Tables 2.1 and 2.2 summarize the relevant information derived from the U.S. Census Bureau 2015-2019 American Community Survey.

Four Factor Analysis

Factor 1: The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible to be served or likely to be encountered by a program, activity, or service of the recipient or grantee.

Map 2.1 illustrates the geographic distribution of individuals 5 years old and older with limited English proficiency in the Denver Regional Council of Governments' planning area. The total number of people with limited English proficiency in the Denver region is approximately 215,060, or 8% of the total population age 5 and older of 2.85 million.

Map 2.1 Distribution of individuals with limited English proficiency



Table 3.1, derived from the 2015-2019 American Community Survey, shows top individual languages spoken at home in the Denver region by the number of individuals 5 years old and older with limited English proficiency that speak those particular languages. Spanish or Spanish Creole is by far the most common non-English language spoken at home. The secondmost common language is Vietnamese.

DRCOG staff has developed maps B.1 through B.5 in Appendix B to illustrate the geographic distribution of the top five non-English language groups in the Denver region.

Table 3.2, also derived from the 2015-2019 American Community Survey, shows the top 10 languages spoken by people 5 years old and older with limited English proficiency, by county, within the DRCOG planning area. Geographic concentrations of people with limited English proficiency who speak certain languages is considered for specific events or project outreach.

In addition to the regional data presented on the previous pages, the U.S. Department of Transportation and the Colorado Department of Transportation recommend consulting school board data because it is easy to obtain, reliable and accurate. Such data for the entire state, compiled by the Colorado Department of Education, is available in Appendix C as a map limited to the Denver region.

Factor 2: The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the program.

The previous analysis showed that approximately 8% of the region's population age 5 and older are individuals with limited English proficiency, with the majority speaking Spanish or Spanish Creole. Since the previous Limited English Proficiency Plan was completed in 2018, DRCOG has received no requests, formal or otherwise, by individuals with limited English proficiency seeking the translation of documents or interpreters at public meetings. DRCOG staff has proactively translated several documents into Spanish and secured an interpreter for at least one public event to assist with possible language assistance needs.

DRCOG has interacted with individuals with limited English proficiency in other specific activities, including:

Metropolitan Planning Organization: DRCOG staff do not provide direct critical services to individuals. Activities are focused on regional planning efforts and allocation of funds to transportation projects to be implemented by other agencies and local governments. Thus, there is limited contact with the general public at large (as compared with a public transit agency). DRCOG staff used Spanishlanguage surveys, videos and online engagement tools with easy translation features during development of the 2050 Metro Vision Regional Transportation Plan from 2019 to 2021.

- Area Agency on Aging: The division receives about 6,700 requests per year regarding its services from individuals who speak Spanish or other languages. Included in the yearly total are nearly 700 uses of the phone interpretation service; about 4,400 requests in case management; 260 requests for the State Health Insurance Assistance Program; 450 requests for options counseling; and about 1,000 requests for navigators. DRCOG staff who speak multiple languages other than English complete much of this translation activity.
- Way to Go program: In the past, the Way to Go program has received, on average, 22 requests for Spanish-language assistance per year.

Factor 3: The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the recipient to people's lives.

DRCOG uses federal funds for activities such as:

- Planning for long-range and short-range transportation projects to be implemented by other agencies and local governments.
- Administering contracts with entities that conduct health screenings or deliver meals to homes or congregate dining sites.
- Aiding persons wishing to carpool, vanpool or use other travel modes.

Providing referral assistance to individuals with aging-related questions for themselves, family members or acquaintances.

DRCOG itself does not directly provide immediate emergency assistance services such as medical treatment or shelter, however, staff of the Area Agency on Aging division provide referrals for individuals requiring such assistance.

Involvement in DRCOG's activities is entirely voluntary. Anyone can participate in the planning process or access services by contacting DRCOG staff (in person or via phone, email or by visiting the DRCOG website) or attending an event or meeting. DRCOG encourages participation by all residents of the region, including individuals with limited English proficiency.

As part of the transportation programming and planning process, DRCOG and its planning partners examine the effects of transportation funding throughout the region in order to identify any disparate or disproportionate effect on its vulnerable populations. DRCOG's major plans and programs for which its staff perform these types of analyses include:

- Metro Vision Regional Transportation Plan.
- Transportation Improvement Program

DRCOG encourages public input and involvement from all residents or their representatives. DRCOG posts agendas for all meetings, which are open to the public,

on the DRCOG website. DRCOG staff is available to address community organizations as requested. DRCOG staff fields inquiries from the public regarding transportation projects, other planning activities and aging services. DRCOG frequently updates its website so residents can learn about and follow DRCOG activities.

While individuals with limited English proficiency are encouraged to participate directly in DRCOG's regional activities, they are often more engaged at the local level with DRCOG member governments or in association with local projects. Local engagement is essential, as the feedback received at the local level can then be communicated to staff involved with DRCOG's regional programs.

Factor 4: The resources available to the recipient and costs.

The fourth factor of the analysis weighs the preceding three factors to assess the needs of individuals with limited English proficiency within the Denver region compared with the resources available to DRCOG and the costs of providing access. DRCOG is committed to offering all residents in the region the opportunity to participate in and receive services from DRCOG's activities. The Limited English Proficiency Implementation Plan described below uses costefficient and productive measures to ensure language barriers are not preventing individuals with limited English proficiency from participating meaningfully in DRCOG's activities.



Implementation plan

Safe Harbor

Federal law provides a "Safe Harbor" provision so a recipient of federal funds, such as the Denver Regional Council of Governments, can ensure it complies with its Title VI obligation to provide written translations of its documents to individuals with limited English proficiency, as applicable. A "Safe Harbor" means that if the recipient has created a plan for the provision of written translations under a specific set of circumstances, such action will be considered strong evidence of compliance with written translation obligations under Title VI.

DRCOG has determined that written translations of every core document would be so burdensome as to defeat the legitimate objectives of the DRCOG Limited English Proficiency plan. Many documents DRCOG prepares are more than 50 pages in length. Accordingly, DRCOG finds it is more appropriate to adhere to the following policies:

- Provide oral interpretation options to individuals with limited English proficiency to access, learn about and comment on DRCOG's documents.
- Provide Spanish-language versions of key documents as appropriate. DRCOG will consider the length, popularity, service function (for example Way to Go services and aging assistance) or essential nature of such documents (for example, surveys to solicit public input) to individuals with limited English proficiency.
- Provide web-based translation options on the DRCOG website drcog.org.

Consider specific requests for translated versions of documents upon request.

Identifying individuals who may need language assistance

When encountering an individual with limited English proficiency whose language is unknown, DRCOG staff use Language Identification Flashcards to identify the person's primary language see Appendix A. Copies are stored in DRCOG's main lobby and public meeting rooms (Aspen, Birch, Douglas Fir, Black Canyon, Maroon Bells, Mesa Verde, Red Rocks, Royal Gorge, Seven Falls and Trail Ridge). Language Identification Flashcards, as developed by the U.S. Census Bureau, bear the phrase "Mark this box if you read or speak [name of language]" translated into 38 languages. The individual with limited English proficiency can then denote their language and staff can respond as appropriate to provide or obtain assistance. The Language Identification Flashcards may be downloaded at no cost at: http://www.lep.gov/ISpeakCards2004.pdf.

DRCOG also makes the Language Identification Flashcards available to the public through its website, so individuals with limited English proficiency contacting DRCOG online can communicate their primary language to DRCOG staff. DRCOG staff can then use that information to provide language assistance to the person with limited English proficiency. DRCOG also makes the Language Identification Flashcards available at all public meetings. Once an individual's primary language is identified using the flashcards, DRCOG staff will assess the feasibility of providing written translation service or oral interpretation assistance for the person with limited English proficiency.

For DRCOG activities focused on a specific geographic area of the region, its staff consult U.S. Census Bureau and Colorado Department of Education data to determine whether there are high concentrations of specific groups of people with limited English proficiency in the area. DRCOG maintains maps depicting concentrated areas of the five largest non-English speaking language groups (Spanish or Spanish Creole, Vietnamese, Chinese, African Languages and Korean) see Appendix B.

Language assistance measures

If DRCOG receives a request for assistance in a language other than English, staff members will follow these steps, as needed.

- Take the person's name and contact information.
- Use the Language Identification Flashcards, if needed, to determine the person's primary language
- For transportation demand management services, including Schoolpool, if assistance cannot be provided in the required language and formal interpretation is required, staff use the telephone interpreter service, Certified Languages International at 1-800-225-5254. This service is offered at no charge to the caller, with DRCOG paying the provider fee.

The DRCOG website may be translated using free online translation services such as Google Translate. Similarly, agendas, minutes and other documents posted online can be translated as well. DRCOG website is also accessible for people with disabilities, demonstrated by a place to click to enlarge the font, magnify text, adjust line spacing or increase contrast if

needed. Website users can also choose to display the site in modes specific to the needs of people who have seizures, cognitive disabilities, ADHD or who prefer to use keyboard navigation of the site.

DRCOG staff may possess limited in-house translation capabilities or expertise to assist individuals with limited English proficiency, and cannot accurately assess or guarantee the accuracy of translation services provided by others. Within its limited budget and capabilities, DRCOG pledges it will, to the best of its abilities, ensure people with limited English proficiency have a meaningful opportunity to participate in DRCOG activities and receive applicable services.

Staff training

Current and incoming staff members whose jobs include interacting with the public are briefed on the DRCOG Limited English Proficiency Plan, trained in using the Language Identification Flashcards and provided with information on assisting people with limited English proficiency. Staff are also instructed to immediately inform the Communications and Marketing division's public engagement planner, who will maintain a record of language assistance requests so needs may be accurately assessed in the future.

Monitoring and updating the Limited English Proficiency Plan

The Limited English Proficiency Plan will be updated every three years in connection with the required regular three-year update of the Title VI Implementation Plan. Non-English products produced, and activities conducted, will be monitored, along with the tracking of specific limited English proficiency requests received and responses provided.

Updates to the Limited English Proficiency Plan may consider the following factors:

- How many individuals with limited English proficiency were encountered or requested services? Were their needs met? Does analytical data regarding website use reveal valuable information?
- What is the current population of individuals with limited English proficiency in the DRCOG planning area?
- Has there been a change in the types of languages for which translation services are needed?
- Have DRCOG's available resources, such as technology, staff and financial costs, changed?
- Were any complaints received?
- Have new federal or state regulations concerning Limited English Proficiency plans been approved requiring changes to the Limited English Proficiency Plan or DRCOG's process for addressing individuals with limited English proficiency?

Dissemination and provision of notice

The Limited English Proficiency Plan is posted on the DRCOG website in both English and Spanish. Copies of the Limited English Proficiency Plan are also available at DRCOG. DRCOG will provide a copy of the Limited English Proficiency Plan to any person or agency upon request.

Public accommodation and accessibility

DRCOG promotes full accommodation and access to its meetings by publishing the following statement on its meeting agendas: "Attendees can request additional aids or services, such as interpretation or assistive listening devices, by calling 303-480-6701 or emailing [meeting organizer email address]. Please notify DRCOG at least 48 hours in advance so we can coordinate your request."

Additionally, in the summer of 2021 DRCOG developed the following document accommodation statement that will be included on documents as appropriate: "To receive these documents in accessible formats, such as in languages other than English, please call 303-455-1000 or email drcog@drcog.org so we can coordinate your request."

Complaint procedures and forms

Any individual that believes that they have been subjected to discrimination or retaliation, by any of the Denver Regional Council of Governments programs, services or activities, as prohibited by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and related statutes may file a written complaint. All written complaints received by DRCOG shall be reviewed immediately.






Map B.1: Individuals with limited English proficiency: Spanish or Spanish Creole language




Map B.2: Individuals with limited English proficiency: Vietnamese language




Map B.3: Individuals with limited English proficiency: Chinese language



Map B.4: Individuals with limited English proficiency: African languages




Map B.5: Individuals with limited English proficiency: Korean language

Appendix D: Complaint procedures and forms

Nondiscrimination complaint procedures

The Denver Regional Council of Governments ("DRCOG") follows Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, a nondiscrimination policy in which no person shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any federally funded program activity.

Herein follows the DRCOG complaint procedure to assist anyone who believes they have been negatively impacted.

DRCOG's Title VI Coordinator ("Coordinator") is available to review any concerns about potential violations.

In order to file a formal Title VI complaint against DRCOG or a recipient of federal funds from DRCOG, the following steps need to be followed:

- 1) The complainant will contact the Coordinator. If a complaint is received by any other DRCOG staff member, that staff member will refer the complaint to the Coordinator.
- 2) The Coordinator will conduct an initial determination of the sufficiency of the complaint to be a potential violation of Title VI.
- 3) If it is determined that the complaint does not meet the basic criteria to be a violation of Title VI, then a determination will be made on whether the issue can be informally resolved or administratively closed. That determination will be communicated to the complainant.
- 4) If it is determined that the complaint meets the basic criteria of a potential violation of Title VI, then an

investigation will be conducted by an investigator. The investigation will be completed within 60 days from the date it is determined the complaint is sufficient. A formal notice will be sent to the complainant.

- 5) The level and method of investigation will be determined on a case-by-case basis and is at the discretion of the investigator. A final report of findings from the investigation will be prepared by the investigator. A final notice of findings will be sent to the complainant by DRCOG. If the investigation is conducted by a Regional Civil Rights Specialist, a copy of the report and final notice of findings will be sent to the Coordinator. The final notice will include the process for filing an appeal of the decision.
- 6) A complainant may appeal a decision by submitting a request in writing within 30 days of the final notice. The request should include information detailing why the complainant believes the decision was made in error. The complainant will be given information on how to appeal this decision directly with the state or federal funding agency in the final notice.

How to file a complaint:

If you believe that you and/or any person(s) under your care have been discriminated against by any organization that receives funds from DRCOG for any of its programs, services, facilities or activities, please complete a discrimination complaint form as found attached. Please provide:

- Your full name, address, telephone number and the name of the person who you believe has discriminated against you.
- The name of the organization that you believe has discriminated, its address and telephone number, and any other identifying information.
- A description of the actions that you believe were discriminatory (dates of actions, names of those who you believe discriminated, and witnesses).
- Any other information that you believe necessary to support your complaint. Please send copies of relevant documents, and keep originals.

A continuación, aparece el procedimiento del Consejo de Gobierno Regional de Denver (DRCOG) para presentar demandas y asistir a cualquier persona que sienta que haya sido impactada de manera negativa.

El Coordinador de demandas contra la Discriminación del DRCOG ("Coordinador") está disponible para revisar cualquier preocupación sobre posibles violaciones.

- 4) Si se determina que la demanda cumple con los criterios básicos de una posible violación del Título VI, entonces se llevará a cabo una investigación con un investigador. La investigación se completará dentro de los 60 días a partir de la fecha en que se determine que la demanda es suficiente. Se enviará una notificación formal al demandante.
- 5) El nivel y el método de investigación se determinarán caso por caso, y quedarán a discreción del investigador. Un informe final de los resultados de la investigación será preparado por el investigador. Una notificación final de todos los hallazgos le será enviada al demandante por parte de DRCOG. Si la investigación es llevada a cabo por un especialista regional de derechos civiles, entonces una copia del reporte y la notificación final de los hallazgos será enviada al coordinador. La notificación final incluirá detalles del proceso para apelar la decisión.
- 6) Todo demandante puede apelar la decisión presentando una solicitud por escrito dentro de un plazo de 30 días de haber recibido la notificación final. Dicha solicitud deberá incluir información detallada sobre el por qué el demandante considera que la decisión se tomó de manera equivocada. En la notificación final, el demandante recibirá información en cuanto a cómo apelar la decisión directamente ante la agencia financiera estatal o federal.
