What would you like to see in the Gold Corridor? Join us for a public forum and let your voice be heard! Now is the time to provide your thoughts on what you would like to see the corridor become.

What is the Gold Corridor?

The Gold Corridor includes station areas and neighborhoods along the RTD Gold Rail Line, an 11.2-mile electric commuter rail transit corridor that connects Denver Union Station to Wheat Ridge, passing through northwest Denver, Adams County, and Arvada. With opening anticipated in 2016, planning and construction are already in full swing!

- Pecos
- Sheridan
- Arvada Ridge
- 41st & Fox
- Federal
- Olde Town
- Ward Road

Over the past decade plans have been developed at the local level for individual stops along the line. The Sustainable Communities Initiative (SCI) looks at the entire corridor to create a unifying vision and goals, identify challenges and opportunities and develop transit-oriented development (TOD) implementation strategies. That's where you come in – we want your feedback on how to make the Gold Corridor successful!
